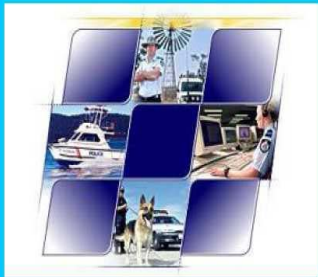

Securing your business

There are many forms of crime that affect businesses.

By taking some simple steps, you can greatly reduce the risk to your business.



Securing your Business

What can you do?

- Display your business name and address at the front of your premises to help emergency services locate your property quickly
- Place warning signs/stickers around your business to deter intruders e.g. no cash kept on premises
- Ensure clear visibility inside and outside your business by using good lighting and keeping it clutter free
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed to help reduce concealment opportunities and increase visibility when travelling to and from your business
- Install solid external doors and fit with quality locks (deadbolts/deadlocks)
- Reinforce glass in doors/windows with shatter resistant film or laminated glass
- Protect windows with security screens and window locks
- Record details of property/assets owned by your business and mark for identification purposes
- Consider installing a safe - securely anchor the safe to wall/floor and always keep it locked
- Establish secure cash handling and banking procedures for your business
- Limit the amount of cash kept on your premises and count it out of public view
- Provide police with your business keyholder information and keep it up-to-date
- Position CCTV cameras at point-of-sale and entry/exits and test regularly
- Monitor your security alarm system and test regularly to reduce false alarms

Security should be adapted to suit your business needs.

Provide your staff with regular training in the use of your business security measures and procedures.

Securing your vehicle

Most car thefts are opportunistic.

There are a number of things you can do to reduce the risk of having your car stolen or broken into.



Securing Your Vehicle

What can you do?

- Always lock your vehicle, including the boot and sun roof and remember to fully close the windows
- Remove or place out of sight all valuables and personal documents when leaving your car unattended
- Park your vehicle in a well-lit and highly visible area
- Wherever possible use off street parking or secure parking
- Remove keys from the ignition if your vehicle is parked or unattended - even if only for a minute
- Don't hide spare keys on the vehicle - thieves know where to look
- Take your vehicle keys with you if you are going out, even if you are leaving your vehicle at home
- Keys should not be marked with personal or vehicle details - use your personal property identification code
- Don't leave vehicle keys lying around on tables, benches, bedside tables or key hooks - keep them out of sight
- When parking in a garage, ensure both the garage and vehicle are locked and the garage door remotes are secured
- Consider using the following to help protect your vehicle - car alarm, immobiliser, ignition shield, steering wheel lock, window etching, microdots or GPS tracker
- Use lockable devices - such as lockable fuel caps, wheel nuts, spare tyre covers, roof racks
- For older vehicles install an engine immobiliser that meets Australian Standards A4601:1999
- Secure your vehicles registration plates e.g. affix with one way screws

Adopt good vehicle and key security habits.

The majority of stolen vehicles are over 10 years old and don't have reliable security devices. Fitting a certified engine immobiliser offers the greatest protection for older cars.

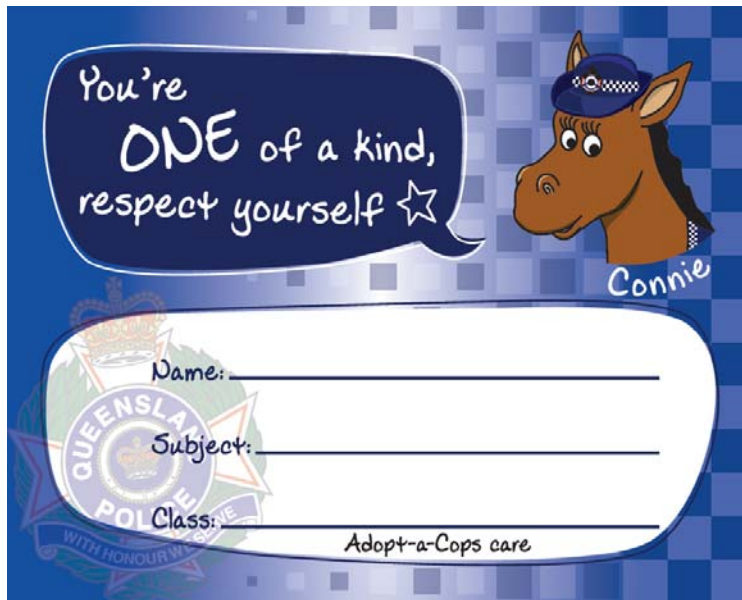
Police will remove your number plates and re-attach them with one-way screws so the plates can only then be removed with a special 'un-do-it' tool.
